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Hospice Nursing Documentation: Supporting Terminal Prognosis

• **Clinical documentation requirement for hospice coverage:** - Patient record must support documentation in technical elements. • **Terminal prognosis of 6 months or less** • **LCD criteria** - Days in any billing period without corresponding documentation showing eligibility are unpaid. **IDG, CARE PLAN, SERVICE COORDINATION IDG, Care Plan, Service Coordination** • **Approach to Service Delivery**

Hospice Clinical Documentation

Hospice Documentation. Hospice providers must establish and maintain a clinical record for every individual receiving care and services. The record must be complete, promptly and accurately documented, readily accessible and systematically organized to facilitate retrieval. The record must include all services, whether furnished directly or under arrangements made by the hospice.

Hospice Documentation - CGS Medicare

• **Documentation certifying terminal status must contain enough information to support terminal status upon review.** • **Re-certifications require same Clinical Standards are met as certification.** • **Documentation must paint a picture of why the patient is appropriate for Hospice and the Level of Care provided.**

Many of the most commonly cited deficiencies have a documentation component, such as standards related to the care plan, comprehensive assessments and medication regimens. Inaccurate documentation can also lead to incorrect claims to Medicare, which can cost a hospice money in addition to the risk of an audit.

Hospice Documentation Checklist Claim Information Initial . **DOS: SOC: Documentation of Beneficiary Election** An individual (or his/her authorized representative) must elect hospice care to receive it. The initial election is for a 90-day period. An individual may elect to receive Medicare coverage for two 90-day

2. **Provide specific and descriptive documentation about what is going on with the patient, and why you are seeing the patient today. Be descriptive enough that someone who had not seen the patient could read the documentation and be well informed of the patient's current condition. Beware of copying and pasting from prior entries.** 3.

Documentation and Coding Handbook: Palliative Care

By Dr. Saul Ebema. The single-most-scrutinized area for hospice providers by the U.S centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) is patient eligibility. While most hospice programs are admitting eligible patients, they often don't prove eligibility with their documentation. From admission, to clinician visits, to recertification, nurses, social workers, and chaplains must document unequivocally whether the patient is chronically ill versus terminally ill.

Five Steps to proper Hospice Chaplain Documentation- For ...

Level of Care (LOC) Does the documentation support the level of care billed? • **When and why the LOC was changed. If Continuous Home Care (CHC) is billed, is a minimum of 8 hours of nursing, hospice aide, and/ or homemaker care provided during a 24-hour day (begins and ends at midnight) and at least**

Submitting inadequate or incomplete required written documentation is a sure-fire way to bring surveyors or auditors to a hospice's doorstep. As regulators increasingly fix their eyes on the hospice space, providers need to ensure their documentation is airtight. 'Each day of [general inpatient] care must be supported in the documentation.

Hospices Avoid General Inpatient Care Audits with Solid ...

Certified Hospice and Palliative Nursing Assistants (CHPNAs) and Certified Hospice and Palliative Licensed Nurses (CHPLNs), on the other hand, are responsible for providing hands-on nursing care around the clock. CHPNA's and CHPLN's are in charge of day to day nursing activities like managing the patient's pain symptoms, and comfort level.

Continuous home care (CHC) day is a day in which an individual who has elected to receive hospice care is not in an inpatient facility and receives hospice care consisting predominantly of nursing care for at least 8 hours in a 24 hour period at home. Hospice aide or homemaker services may also be provided
