Kohut described the differences in content and outcome of classical psychoanalysis versus analysis of the self in his much examined key paper: “The Two Analyses of Mr. Z.”**“Although self psychology evolved out of the psychoanalytic tradition, it is a major departure from traditional drive theory and object relations theory.****8,9**

Self psychology, a modern psychoanalytic theory and its clinical applications, was conceived by Heinz Kohut in Chicago in the 1960s, 70s, and 80s, and is still developing as a contemporary form of psychoanalytic treatment.

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The basic motivational energy and the primary unit of analysis in Kohut's system is provided by the relationship of the self to self- objects. Kohut then places into this new framework the concepts concerning the two branches of narcissism he had developed in 1971, changing his terminology slightly.

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
