During the entire play, the main character, Oedipus, suffers from all types of irony ranging from verbal, to situational, to dramatic. Oedipus' becoming of a victim irony pushes him into a corner so tight, he sees no way out. Verbal irony is exemplified in the play of Oedipus Rex. The statement made by Oedipus at the beginning of the play, "Then once more I must bring what is dark to light" (Oedipus Rex, Prologue, line 134) is a prime example of one saying things they do not mean.
