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LYMPNE ROMAN FORT. Lympne Roman Fort originally overlooked a tidal lagoon and natural harbour. The fort served as an operational base for the British arm of the Roman Navy, the Classis Britannica, and was later incorporated into the Command of the Count of the Saxon Shore.

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Risingham Roman Fort was built in the second century AD as one a chain of outposts that extended north to the Antonine Wall, the Roman frontier in central Scotland. When the Romans withdrew to Hadrian's Wall, 12 miles to the south of Risingham, the fort remained occupied. Attacked several times, it was abandoned in the fourth century.

PIERCEBRIDGE ROMAN FORT and the RIVER TEES/DERE STREET ROMAN BRIDGE Dere Street was constructed as the Roman army advanced north during the latter years of the first century AD. That road was carried over the River Tees at Piercebridge where the Romans built a substantial bridge over the fast flowing river.

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Binchester Roman Fort. The fort straddled Dere Street whilst the River Wear, a key communications and logistical artery, was located to the immediate south and west of the facility. The earlier fort, which was established circa-AD 75, occupied around 17 acres. This was replaced circa-AD 150 by a smaller fort.

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British Camp is an Iron Age hill fort located at the top of Herefordshire Beacon in the Malvern Hills. The hill fort is protected as a Scheduled Ancient Monument and is owned and maintained by Malvern Hills Conservators. The fort is thought to have been first constructed in the 2nd century BC. A Norman castle was built on the site.

The earliest known semi-permanent forts were constructed in Spain during the 2nd century BCE, but it was during the reign of Augustus (27 BCE – 14 CE) that Roman forts began to assume a standardised form. Forts varied in size with the smallest measuring under a single hectare while the larger ones could be over 50 hectares in area.

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
