This is, of course, reflected, in turn, in the literature and in the characters created during this time, as well as in the form of the literature and perspectives, intertextual allusions, seemingly missing chronology and complex, at times puzzling, structures. In creating a speaker as insecure, helpless and lonely as the title character of his long poem "The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock" Prufrock, one that exemplifies and symbolizes, also by way of the structure of the poem itself, the situation of the individual in early 20 th century urban society.
